For Preschool children, 2 months old to 5 years old, you must call for registration and an appointment. These children will be seen by appointment only on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m..

<u>Well-Baby Clinic</u> - The Well-Baby Clinic is for uninsured or underinsured children from birth to age 5. Well-baby visits with the doctor are available.

Results are given verbally on the day of testing within 15 minutes. Also provides free testing for Gonorrhea and Chlamydia.

Services: Free weekly group therapy for bereavement is provided for children ages 5 to 17 at St. Joseph's Church, 317 Avenue E, Bayonne, NJ. There is a simultaneously run parent group for surviving parents and guardians. Group is for general bereavement related to any recent death (AIDS, cancer, homicide, etc.). Groups meet on Wednesday evenings for 10 weeks. Call Sharon to schedule an intake. Van transportation may be available for some families. Intake appointments are usually scheduled around 4:30 or 5:00 but occasionally after 6:00. Groups usually begin in the months of September to June.

<u>SAD, MAD, GLAD PROGRAM</u> – A special interactive session to help children age 5 to 8 years cope with the loss of a loved one (All losses). This program is available to your school free of charge.

FEATHER THE CLOWN - A new program offered to students in pre-K, Kindergarten, first and second grade who may have experienced a loss. Feather the clown will come into the classroom and provide support and education. Teachers and/or school personnel can call to request a presentation. The presentation is free of charge.

Services: Low cost rental buildings where rental cost is based on family income for single adults as well as families, 30% of income goes toward rent. Criteria for the program is that the HIV positive client (or family), at the time of application, is homeless. If substance abuse has been an issue for the client, a period of 6 months of sobriety is necessary. Support services are provided to families or adults.

- A. Shelter Plus Care Program Funded principally by HUD through NJ State Department of Community Affairs. Targeted but not limited to applicants who are HIV+ and/or diagnosed with a mental illness. Provides a housing voucher (like Section 8), where client pays a portion of their rent. Homeless individuals and families are eligible. Regular case management services are provided to help the client stay healthy and housed and link client to needed services. Family must have an income and agree to the case management services. Client must be currently homeless according to HUD criteria (staying on street, in shelter, or in transitional housing program). A physician's certification of disability is needed but family must be capable of independent living (with case management).
- **B.** <u>Corpus Christi Ministries Housing</u> Funded by HOPWA, administration by Jersey City and the Hudson County Ryan White Planning Council. Individuals have a private room in a house shared with four other individuals. Families have an apartment in a building occupied by other CCMH families. Participation in case management to aid adherence and health, and help client identify and achieve goals.
- **C.** <u>Hudson CASA</u> Provides case management, including benefits counseling and referrals to other services. The program also provides in-house employment specialists and housing specialists to aid clients in seeking employment and/or housing.
- **D.** <u>Housing for HIV Positive Adults without Children</u> Housing and supportive services for HIV positive adults without children.

E. Housing for Families with an HIV Positive Parent or Child - Housing assistance for families with an HIV positive parent or child. Appropriate for families who need the added support of on-call services or social services, in addition to the low rent.

*Please note that the Referral Criteria for the above programs: The client must be HIV+ homeless, and drug and alcohol free for at least 30 days. In some cases client must also be certified as disabled. Clients must be willing to follow program rules, including regular participation in Ryan White case management. Family eligibility requires one HIV+ family member, and family size must be suitable for available housing.

Services: Rental assistance to the HIV positive adult (single adult or head of a family) in paying part of their rent. Referrals to this program come <u>only</u> from case managers at Hyacinth, Center for Comprehensive Care, Christ Hospital or Faith Services (or other continuum of care providers for HIV positive clients). Referral is only accepted if the HIV positive patient is <u>actively</u> involved with their case management services. School personnel cannot refer to this program directly but can encourage clients to work with their case manager at their respective continuum of care site to see if they meet the guidelines for this program.

This program is designed to offer comprehensive treatment to clients being diagnosed as substance dependent.

- 2. Therapeutic Nursery Program- This is a six hour therapeutic program servicing children ages 3-5 that are not in kindergarten and who are experiencing emotional and behavioral concerns that require a higher level of care than one outpatient visit per week. All children receive a comprehensive Psychiatric evaluation upon entering the program. Transportation available within Jersey City for those families that qualify. The child receives group, individual and family therapy with a Masters level clinician and developmental and social skills groups throughout the day. The Program also has a Family Specialist that can make home visits to help the family reach goals and stabilization within the home and school.
- 3. Adolescent Afterschool Program This daily three hour therapeutic program is offered to teenagers 11 to 17 who are experiencing mental health issues such as depression, anxiety, and impulse control/behavioral problems. Group therapy focuses on anger management, social skills building and handling stress, as well as individual and family therapy, as needed. Psychiatric evaluation is mandatory. Classified or non-classified students accepted. Program is best for teens without seriously aggressive behaviors that are in need of a higher level of mental health treatment than one hour of therapy a week. Program meets from 3:30 P.M. to 6:45 P.M. Medicaid or charity care accepted. Transportation available within Jersey City for families that qualify.
- 4. New Start Day Program This is a three-hour therapeutic program (12:30 p.m. to 3:45 p.m.) for clients ages 10-17 who are not able to be maintained in a school setting due to mental health issues such as Major Depression, Anxiety, Psychosis, Post-traumatic stress, etc. that interfere with day to day functioning. Clients attend curriculum specific groups based on their psychiatric needs such as peer conflict groups, controlling anxiety/relaxation groups etc. Psychiatric services and transportation within Jersey City also provided. Note: This program is for students who are not attending school. It may be an appropriate program for some home instruction students who are experiencing mental health issues. A goal of the program is to help these students return to school.

The program is designed to keep families intact during times of crisis including assistance to parents with mentally or physically disabled children. Examples of family crisis include parental stress, new parent, teen parent, multiple births, a death in the family or a hospitalized spouse. A case worker and homemaker make regular visits to assist in establishing a household routine, such as assisting children with homework, etc. Based on the case worker's assessment, the homemaker may be provided up to twenty hours a week so that young children will be adequately cared for and so that over-burdened parents can receive support and guidance during periods of stress. It is a short-term program with low income. The program may be helpful to a family who is not yet appropriate to refer to DYFS, but in need of some assistance so as to prevent referral. This program does **not** involve babysitting. Some adult **must be present** while services are being provided. Contact intake at ext. 402 or 404.

B. CASE Program

This program provides counseling and parenting skills in the home for open DYFS cases. These cases must be referred by DYFS. More hours of service are provided to these families, including overnights. Contact intake at ext. 402 or 404.

C. Respite and Personal Care Services

This program provides homemakers services, respite care, and personal care assistants (P.C.A.) to the elderly or disabled adults. There are income guidelines for the respite program, which is available to caretakers of anyone 18 or older (handicapped or disabled). The P.C.A. program is for Medicaid clients who are disabled adults, and some disabled children. The respite program is income and need based, but it is <u>not</u> a Medicaid program. - **A**. Living with a blood relative or legal guardian whose income is low enough that the household will qualify for T.A.N.F. <u>or</u> whose guardian is on T.A.N.F and is participating in a Work First NJ activity and
- **B**. Attending school or an approved Work First NJ program <u>full-time</u>, and
- C. Providing information to the Child Support Unit about the baby's father.

*If the teen parent is not eligible for T.A.N.F. for any reason, the teen parent and her guardian should still apply for Medicaid for the baby and teen at County Welfare. If the guardian's total monthly income is too high for the teen and baby to qualify for Medicaid, the guardian may apply for NJ Family Care (1-800-701-0710) instead. There is also "presumptive eligibility" for Medicaid available at Horizon and other local women's clinics for pregnant women (see 1-C below)

Two of the shelters are located near Ramsey, NJ, one in Mendham NJ, and one in Washington Township. Most clients are accepted within the first five months of pregnancy. Minors <u>or</u> women over 18 years old are also accepted. The clients attend local high schools, G.E.D. programs, receive tutoring in the shelter or are locally employed. They also receive counseling and case management. They can stay up until the baby's first birthday. For females under 18, parent or guardian must give permission for her to stay if the client plans to enroll in a local high school. However, based on family circumstances some minors are accepted without parent permission.

IV. DYFS-HOMES FOR PREGNANT TEENS UNDER AGE 18

Placements by DYFS are available for teen mothers under age eighteen in need of housing with her baby. There are currently seven placements, all still located in municipalities outside of Hudson County. However, there is no guarantee that the teen mom and baby will not be separated in the event that there are no available placements. The case should be referred to DYFS if the teen and baby are homeless and/or at risk for abuse or neglect where they are currently living.

Services: The New Jersey Safe Haven Infant Protection Act allows a parent or his/her designee to surrender a new born, age 30 days or less, to any hospital emergency room or police station. No questions asked. As long as there are no signs of abuse the person can surrender a baby to a staff member by indicating that it is a SAFE HAVEN BABY, without fear of arrest or prosecution. A self addressed medical questionnaire is available and will be given to the individual at the time of the surrender. Any information regarding the family medical history provided will be helpful and can be done anonymously. The infant will be examined and given medical treatment as needed. Once the baby is surrendered under the Safe Haven Law, the state takes immediate custody and is placed in a pre-adoptive home. If the parent and/or family member has not come forward to claim the infant within 21 days of the surrender, DYFS will proceed with the permanent adoption of the baby. Please note if there are signs of abuse or neglect, then the Safe Haven Law does not apply and the case will be referred to DYFS.

CHAPTER 9

CHILDCARE

Overview: There are several categories that a client would fall into which determine which agency the referral is processed through and/or the funding source for a childcare slot. The categories are:

- I. Families Receiving Public Assistance (T.A.N.F.) & attending school or training approved by Work First NJ (*Urban League staff at 257 Cornelison Ave.*)
- 2. Families recently terminated from T.A.N.F. and now working (referred by caseworker at 257 Cornelison Ave. for assistance at Urban League on MLK Drive)
- 3. Working families in need of childcare referral and partial reimbursement (if income eligible) (*Urban League of Hudson County on MLK Drive*)
- 4. Those with temporary custody of a child via the Family Court (handled by the Urban League of Hudson County's "Kinship Program")

I. FAMILIES RECEIVING PUBLIC ASSISTANCE (T.A.N.F.)

If the parent or guardian is receiving T.A.N.F. (cash assistance) from Hudson County Welfare and participating in an approved activity, then the childcare is obtained through **Work First NJ.** Client must speak to their individual care manager at 257 Cornelison Ave.

Services: The Work First NJ care manager walks the client through the process of assigning a full-time activity. Once the activity has been chosen and approved, child-care is arranged. Urban League Childcare Counselors are present at the 257 Cornelison Ave. office of Welfare to assist parents in choosing the most appropriate childcare program. Childcare reimbursement is only provided for those engaged in their activity for 35 or more hours per week. If the mother/guardian is attending their activity for a total of 35 hours per week, bus passes maybe offered. Once a client is working full-time and terminates the cash case at Welfare, childcare reimbursement can be approved and continue for up to two years. However, a co-payment will be needed to continue childcare services based on the family income and size. It is very important that clients who choose to close out their cash cases because of work income ask their Income Maintenance worker at 257 Cornelison Ave. to send them to the Urban League for continued childcare financial assistance.

II. WORKING FAMILIES: FULL-TIME or PART-TIME

Program provides child care services for income eligible working parents **not** receiving T.A.N.F.; working grandparent/ guardian not on T.A.N.F.; or teen parent under 18 living at home with a working parent(s) not on T.A.N.F.

A. Child Care Resources and Referrals Services

Our Computerized database of licensed and registered childcare centers allows us to offer childcare referrals based on parents specific needs. The mission of the Child Care Resource and Referral Division of The Urban League of Hudson County is to enrich the lives of children. Quality childcare practices are promoted and encouraged through childcare provider training, parent education, and community outreach activities. The CCR& C division believes in serving as advocates and providing a voice for the children of Hudson County New Jersey. The Urban League of Hudson County is contracted by the Hudson County Department of Human Services to administer the Child Care Resources and Referral Agencies. The CCR&R coordinates childcare and childcare worker certification for Hudson County. Urban League of Hudson County is the only childcare agency that offers Jersey City constituents daycare and family daycare providers for their entire child care needs.

B. Family Daycare Registration Program

As the registering agent for all family daycare providers in Hudson County, we deploy trained home inspectors and counselors to ensure each home daycare provider is in compliance with DYFS regulations, and to provide technical assistance and periodic training. To become a registered daycare provider in the home, contact Lois Carterat (Ext. 194). Based on funding available, there could be a waiting list to get into this program. The state does background checks on all who apply.

C. NJ Cares for Kids

Sponsored by the State of New Jersey this program provides subsidized child care voucher payments for working families and full-time students with children. Our childcare specialists are available to provide our clients with all of their child care options and needs. If a parent had a Welfare case and is only <u>recently</u> working, apply at 257 Cornelison Ave.. If a parent has been off of Welfare for two or more years apply at Martin Luther King Drive. Supervisor for this program is Lena Martin.

D. Work First New Jersey Voucher Program

The Work First New Jersey Division arranges childcare and provides counseling to Temporary Aid to Needy Families (TANF) participants. All participants are referred directly by the Hudson County Board of Social Services. The participants are treated with respect and dignity and thoroughly counseled on their childcare options.

E. Daycare Funding for Teen Parents

If a teen parent is in school <u>full-time</u> <u>and</u> the minor teen parent's guardian is <u>not</u> receiving cash assistance but is working, applications for funding are available through the Urban League. There is a waiting list of approx. 2 to 3 years long. Besides this program, NJ Cares for Kids, funding may also be available for friends or relatives caring for a baby in their home (up to age 2 and a half) via the Infant-Toddler home initiative program, also an Urban League Program.

F. "KINSHIP PROGRAM" - Daycare Funding For those with Custody of a Relative through Family Court

Funding is available only for a relative who assumes legal custody of a child through the Family Court system. Amount of funding is based on the number of hours, if any, that the guardian is working. If not working or disabled, 5 hours per week of child care may be available. For those under the age of 60, you must present proof of income and disability. Contact Alima Watson at extension 173.

G. Approved Home Initiative

Friends, neighbors and relatives who care for the children of parents who receive a childcare subsidy can become "Approved Home Providers." Providers receive training in their homes on health, safety, CPR, nutrition, literacy, and other topics that will benefit the children in their care. Participants are exposed to the type of training needed to become a health care professional. Those wishing to apply for certification registration are encouraged to do so.

H. Childcare Health Consultants

Registered nurses provide guidance and technical assistance to daycare centers and family daycare providers regarding health and safety issues, and conducts workshops on health, parenting and related issues.

- 4) <u>THE TRUE PROGRAM (temporary relief for utility expenses)</u> This program will provides customers, who are not eligible for low income programs such as LIHEAP and/or USF, with up to \$1,000 toward their PSE&G bill. The utility bill must be in the customer's name. The contact number is (1-855-465-8783).

5) NJLIFELINE CREDIT PROGRAM

This program helps senior customers who are at least 65 years old, and disabled customers who are at least 18 years old receiving Social Security Disability, with a \$225.00 utility bill credit. The contact number is (1-800-792-9745).

Services: Anyone who receives Food Stamps, T.A.N. F., Workfirst, SSI, General Assistance, Home Energy Assistance, PAAD or any Medicaid program is entitled to fill out an application for the <u>Lifeline Phone Service Program</u>. The <u>Lifeline Phone Service Program</u> entails:

- 1) A normal activation fee of \$56.85 to initiate phone service for a residence which might be included as an initial payment of \$35.67 which is due on first billing cycle with the remainder of this fee being divided over a 12-month payment period. Fee breakdown depends on credit history, please verify with representatives
- 2) A credit of approximately \$13.27 per month is applied to monthly bills. For those applying for this program that have unpaid old bills with Verizon, the service is still available but toll calls will be blocked. Procedure for applying is: Client picks up application at County Welfare office or a local pharmacy (some have the application) and fills out the application with a 6th floor caseworker's help. Client then calls Verizon at the above number and says the household receives some sort of assistance (of the categories listed above). Verizon will give client a tentative phone number; then client mails the application to Maryland and it takes about 3 weeks before service begins. Tell the caseworker at Welfare that you want the "Verizon NJ Communications Lifeline/Linkup America" application

Services:

A. T.A.N.F. - Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (previously A.F.D.C.) Financial, educational, employment and child support assistance to parents/ legal guardians of dependent children up to age 18, or up to age 21 if in special education. Basis for eligibility is absence, incapacity, unemployment or underemployment of parents. There is a five-year lifetime limit to receive T.A.N.F. benefits in NJ, which began April 2, 1997. People still receiving benefits as of April 1, 2002 and not participating in Work First NJ may lose benefits unless an extension or an exemption is granted for special circumstances. Note: Teen parents under age 18 applying for cash assistance (T.A.N.F.) must be living with a blood relative or legal guardian, and must attend a full-time educational program. Any teen parent under age 20 who has not finished high school must attend high school or a G.E.D. program in order to receive benefits. Cooperation with regard to baby's paternity is also important to ensure that cash assistance will be granted.

Also under welfare reform, children who entered the U.S. legally (with Green cards) after August 22, 1996 are not eligible for T.A.N.F. for five years but may be eligible for NJ Family Care or Medicaid and/or Food Stamps. Apply at 257 Cornelison Ave.. The parents in these circumstances are not eligible for Medicaid unless they fit into one of the categories listed in II below (pregnant, permanently disabled etc. However, they must still be here legally). Families who entered the U.S. illegally are not eligible for either T.A.N.F. or Medicaid.

1. Work First Activity Referrals

Under welfare reform, all new applicants to T.A.N.F., all T.A.N.F. recipients who are going for an annual re-certification, and all T.A.N.F. recipients who request an educational or job program will be assigned a **Work First NJ** caseworker at 257 Cornelison Ave. If client is not already working, she will be required to participate in a core work activity. The activity or combination of activities must total 35 hours a week. No cash assistance is provided unless the parent participates in **Work First NJ** or is determined to be exempt or deferred from participating. Examples for deferment include: someone seven months pregnant or more, someone caring for a baby under 12 weeks of age or someone physically or mentally impaired as diagnosed by a certified physician or who is required in the home to care for a physically/mentally impaired family member for a period less than 12 months. The deferred period **does** count under the lifetime 5-year limit on benefits. **Note: There is a two-year period following closing out of one's cash assistance (due to earned income) where a parent can continue receiving Medicaid and partial childcare reimbursement.** Food stamps are an ongoing benefit that may continue based on a family's total income, shelter cost and family size.

Services: A support program for those working but receiving a "partial grant" (even if it is \$10 per month) a "work support payment" of \$200.00/month may be available instead of the client's current cash grant. For those eligible, this program lasts for up to 24 months and does <u>not</u> count toward the 5 year T.A.N.F. limit. Client must be working a minimum of 20 hours/week for at least 4 months and still receiving T.A.N.F. to be eligible.

3. <u>Daycare funding and referrals for Work First NJ clients/ via Urban League of Hudson</u> County

Services: Daycare funding is available to parents receiving T.A.N.F who are participating in Work First NJ core activity. Teen parents who are full-time high school students <u>must</u> be enrolled in a Work First NJ activity for 30 or more hours a week. When a teen parent's <u>parent</u> is receiving the T.A.N.F. grant to care for the baby, <u>both</u> the teen parent <u>and</u> the grandparent on T.A.N.F. must be involved in a full-time **Work First N.J** activity to receive daycare funding.

Services: This program provides free NJ Transit bus passes for the first three months, and at a reduced rate of 50% for the next three months following the ending of T.A.N.F. benefits for post- T.A.N.F. recipients in need of transitional transportation benefits. II. MEDICAID- MEDICAL ASSISTANCE CUSTOMER CENTER

To apply for Medicaid, there are two considerations: the person's financial eligibility and the category they fall into. The eligible categories for Medicaid are: individuals under 21; pregnant women; those over 65; those who are blind, or permanently disabled. The following is a breakdown of the different Medicaid programs and their guidelines for eligibility:

A. T.A.N.F. Medicaid

Services: Comprehensive health insurance coverage for parents and children who are financially eligible. <u>Note</u>: Under welfare reform, a parent participating in Work first NJ will be given a two-year extension on Medicaid for herself/himself and children after she/he becomes employed. There <u>is a chance of getting more than two years of coverage for some after leaving Welfare.</u>

Once leaving T.A.N.F. Medicaid, parents may apply for insurance for their children through NJ Family Care, if no insurance is available through their employment; however, <u>only</u>

<u>children can now get NJ Family Care</u>. (Since June 15, 2002, caretakers/relatives are no longer eligible for NJ Family Care).

*Note- Some families may not be eligible for T.A.N.F. but their children might still be eligible for Medicaid (Example is a child who entered the U.S. legally, after August 1996 see1A above).

B. Medically Needy Program

Service: Limited Medicaid benefits **for outpatient care only** to certain <u>adults</u> who cannot afford health care services because they do not qualify for Medicaid due to income and who have unpaid medical bills. You get six months of coverage. After six months, you may get re-determined. This program helps prevent further accruement of bills. Call Ms. Sudia or Ms. Marchitto to discuss eligibility.

C. Medicaid Special

Service: Medicaid for **18-21 year olds**. Parent or client who is applying must bring proof of school enrollment if still in school (report card or letter from school); birth certificate, proof of address (if living with someone, a letter from that person and that person's proof of address); social security card and proof of income, if any. Some college students may be eligible for this program.

D. NJ Special Program for Pregnant Individuals - Medical coverage for prenatal care for pregnant non-documented aliens who cannot get regular Medicaid. The program does not cover labor and delivery. Apply at Horizon Health Center or other center that can establish "presumptive eligibility". After the client gives birth, she should apply for Medical Emergency Payment Program for Aliens (see F below). If you have any questions, call 201-217-7100.

E. NJ Care

A program for people who are disabled or aged and whose income is above the SSI cap but does not exceed \$851 for an individual or \$1,141 for a couple. Their resources cannot exceed \$4,000 for an individual or \$6,000 for a couple. Eligible individuals receive full Medicaid benefits. Apply at 257 Cornelison Ave. Contact person is Mrs. Sylvia Sudia or Ms. Angelica Marchitto.

F. Medical Emergency Payment Program for Aliens

Covers undocumented aliens (example- tourist visas, visitors) who are legally admitted but not citizens and who do not have citizenship pending. They are eligible if health is in serious danger/life or death situation <u>or</u> if they are having a baby and coming off of the NJ Supplemental Prenatal Program (see above). <u>Apply at 257 Cornelison Ave..</u>

G. Medical Assistance Customer Center (Formerly State Medicaid Office)

Service: This office provides oversight and monitoring of state Medicaid programs. It provides eligibility information and referrals to various Medicaid programs and services for current Medicaid beneficiaries. This office assists in resolving billing issues for Medicaid beneficiaries and can help clients to access health care services and other community resources. Mr. V. can at times provide phone consultation to school staff assisting parents in completing the NJ Family Care applications.

H. Breast and Cervical Cancer Medicaid Program

Medicaid is available for uninsured women under the age of 65 who are financially eligible and who are citizens or legal immigrants, living here for at least 5 years and who do <u>not</u> qualify for any other Medicaid Programs. Call the 1-800 number for new applications, with questions about the program/ eligibility guidelines or to inquire about the status of an application. If calling about an application that is already there, the head of household's social security number will be needed and the applicant herself/himself must make the call.

(Those Plan A Applications can be processed at Welfare quicker than through Trenton if all paperwork is included)

Services: Medical coverage for children up to the age of 18 who do not qualify for T.A.N.F.-Medicaid or SSI Medicaid because the family income is too high. Family should have no other insurance for the last 6 months at the time they apply but there are exceptions such as when the head of household has been laid off and lost insurance-those families may apply immediately, but show proof of the amount to be received in Unemployment benefits. Beneficiaries must enroll in an HMO for this program. There are various service packages based on the family's size and income.

Child must be a citizen or qualified alien though the parent does <u>not</u> have to be. Parent **must** verify income including "under the table" income, unemployment benefits, child support received etc. A letter from parent's employer on letterhead is now accepted as proof of income. <u>One month's worth of income is now an acceptable amount for income verification</u>. There are seven service plans to Family Care, ranging from A to I. Several plans involve co-payments and premiums. Part A is basically a Medicaid expansion. Under Plan A you can have other insurances.

Note: Parents who are newly applying to NJ Family Care are no longer covered themselves by the program; students now applying are eligible only to age 18, not 19 as in previous years. Teens already on the program can receive benefits through age 19.

IV. EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE (E.A.)

Services: The following help is available to families either receiving T.A.N.F., eligible for

T.A.N.F. or receiving S.S.I. They must meet specific criteria for E.A.

A. Emergency Financial Assistance for Homeless Families - Financial help to prevent or resolve homelessness so that the parent(s) receiving T.A.N.F. or SSI (not Social Security or unemployment) can pursue or return to employment. Services include assistance for back payments of utilities, back payments of rent, security deposit on a newly found apartment that is affordable, Temporary Rental Assistance (T.R.A.) to meet housing costs, clothing,

furniture and/or shelter or hotel placement for families who are technically homeless. In cases of overcrowding, the client must produce a notarized letter from a friend or relative saying they are staying with them temporarily or provide some other proof that they are homeless. If the friend or relative must evict the client because the friend's landlord has become aware of the situation, this should be included in the letter with a time frame of when the family must leave

Emergency Assistance: Temporary Rental Assistance - To receive Temporary Rental Assistance, the client must already have been granted Emergency Assistance, in the form of Shelter or hotel placement <u>or</u> a housing deposit for a new place. T.R.A. is a <u>short-term</u> rental subsidy, lasting only up to six months and counts toward the twelvemonth maximum that a family can receive Emergency Assistance for.

Note: There is a <u>twelve-month lifetime limit for Emergency Assistance</u>. Parent/s must show that the emergency was due to extraordinary circumstances. The client must show proof of paying rent <u>regularly</u> for a period of time. Clients should show that they did everything possible to prevent becoming homeless such as saved money or looked for roommates. Any client rejected for Emergency Assistance has the right to appeal the decision by asking for an Emergency Fair Hearing on the 6th floor. The client should ask for a <u>written documentation</u> of denial at the time of the denial. The client can contact Northeast NJ Legal Services 201-792-6363 to request an entitlements attorney, if they are experiencing difficulty in receiving a written denial or if they believe they will need help or advice with their appeal. Some clients may also request an <u>extension</u> of the twelve-month maximum of emergency assistance. Extensions are given on a case-bycase basis.

- **B.** <u>Financial Assistance for Victims of Domestic Violence, Fires, etc.</u> Financial assistance is available for victims of domestic violence, fires or other disasters. Clients on Welfare who experience a fire are normally directed to the 6th floor by the American Red Cross for help with relocating.
- C. <u>SSH Program Rental Assistance for Working Families</u> This "one-time only" program for working families can cover up to two months of back rent or help with a security deposit for a new apartment for eligible applicants. **Program is for families with someone who is working,** where rental payment has lapsed but family is capable of affording rent. Family cannot be receiving any cash benefits from Welfare. Most applicants have experienced a fire or problem such as an interruption in employment. Bring all information about the rental emergency. Funding for the program fluctuates check for availability.
- **D.** Emergency Energy Services for those on T.A.N.F. and Food Stamps Assistance offered includes the Verizon Lifeline application. Applications are available on the 5th Floor, 257 Cornelison Ave.

E. Supplemental Work Support Program *While not technically an emergency service, this program can help increase certain T.A.N.F. clients' monthly incomes, and therefore help with housing expenses. Clients who are on T.A.N.F. (even if they are receiving a very small grant) for at least 6 months who are employed and have had that job for at least four months may apply for this program. They voluntarily close out their Welfare case in exchange for receiving \$200 per month for the next two years. Childcare and Medicaid benefits will continue for two years. Clients apply with their Work First NJ caseworker at 257 Cornelison Ave., Jersey City, NJ 07302.

V. HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

There are two programs - One for those receiving Food Stamps and another for low-income families **not** receiving Food Stamps.

Applications must be returned in person to P.A.C.O., unless the client is elderly or disabled.
- **2.** <u>NJ Shares Program Emergency Energy Assistance</u> This program is at times available through P.A.C.O. for working class households. The client must not be receiving cash assistance at Welfare, without heat or in danger of being without heat. Contact Ms. Sarina Vega for details. Funding is limited and may not be always available.
- **3.** <u>Assist Food Stamp Recipients with Denial Notices</u> This program provides heating assistance for Food Stamp recipients with denial notices, contact Ms. Sarina Vega for details.
- **4.** <u>Weatherization Program</u> This program assists landlords by weatherizing the home to keep heat in and cold air out and ensuring efficiency of fuel services. Examples of weatherization include insulation, caulking and weather stripping. **The building landlord must make application.** Contact the Union City office at 201-864-3774 for more information.

VI. WELFARE INVESTIGATIONS UNIT/ FRAUD UNIT

VII. WORKFIRST NJ / GENERAL ASSISTANCE

VIII. WIC PROGRAM

Services: The WIC Program offers infant formula for babies up to age 1. Supplemental food (i.e. milk, juice, cereal, eggs) provided to "nutritional risk" groups, pregnant women and children under five. Other services include nutritional education, referral to health clinics and physicians and referral to social services. Walk-ins accepted between 7:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, but appointments may be made and are preferred. Client must bring proof of income for entire household, proof of address, HBID card (formally known as your Medicaid card), and immunization records. Eligibility for program is income-based. W.I.C. registration is also available at Metropolitan Family Health Network at 935 Garfield Avenue Monday mornings only; Primary Care Center of Christ Hospital at 324 Palisades Avenue on Tuesdays from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. and Wednesday mornings at Horizon Health Center located at 706-714 Bergen Avenue. W.I.C. also provides Breast Feeding Support Services.

IX. FOOD STAMPS

Services: Food stamps for income eligible individuals and families. There are two categories of assistance: those receiving public assistance such as cash benefits or Medicaid and those who are not. Families or individuals who wish **only** to apply for Food Stamps (example, families with low incomes, part-time employment, receiving SSI benefits, etc) should go to 257 Cornelison Ave. Clients may apply for Food Stamps **and** any other benefits (cash assistance, Medicaid) at 257 Cornelison Ave. ***If a family arrived in the U.S. after August 22, 1996, they are not eligible to receive Food Stamps until five years have passed**, and even then, only if they arrived here legally. However, if clients' children were born in the U.S. <u>after August 22, 1996</u>, those children may be eligible. Some refugee families may also be eligible for the program. The office is open from 7:30 a.m. - 4:15 p.m.

X. WELFARE'S CHILD SUPPORT AND PATERNITY UNIT

A home visit is conducted. The amount offered yearly can be renewed if circumstances (family size, income) have not changed eligibility status from year to year.

- B. <u>Kinship Guardianship / Monthly Subsidy Program</u>—In place of the monthly grant from Welfare <u>or</u> as a supplement for those with low-incomes from employment or other programs families might receive up to \$250 per month, per child. The amount offered depends on total family income and family size. Cases cannot be open with D.Y.F.S. Proof of custody, a criminal background check and home study are required. <u>It must also be verified that the biological parents do not live in the household.</u> Cases then go to Family Court, and once Kinship Guardianship status is established, the caretaker/s becomes eligible for the monthly subsidy. Those who make too much money to be eligible for the subsidy may still apply for legal guardianship through the help of this program.
- C. <u>Childcare Subsidy Program</u> Childcare subsidy for eligible guardians who are working and are in need of help paying for childcare. Contact the Urban League of Hudson County and ask for the Kinship Program. Phone: 201-451-8888; location is 253 Martin Luther Drive.

The Family Reunification Program applies only to DYFS families being reunified (i.e. parent returning from prison, children returning to parent from foster care), not intact DYFS families under supervision.

A family, once on this list, must update their current address with the Tenant Selection Office at public housing at 410 US Highway 1, preventing removal from the waiting list. It is a short-term program for low income families. The program may be helpful to a family who is not yet appropriate to refer to DYFS, but in need of some assistance so as to prevent referral. B. CASE Program

This program provides counseling and parenting skills in the home for open DYFS cases. These cases must be referred by DYFS. More hours of service are provided to these families, including overnights. Contact intake at ext. 402 or 404.

C. Respite and Personal Care Services

This program provides homemakers services, respite care, and personal care assistants (P.C.A.) to the elderly or disabled adults. There are income guidelines for the respite program, which is available to caretakers of anyone 18 or older (handicapped or disabled). The P.C.A. program is for Medicaid clients who are disabled adults, and some disabled children. The respite program is income and need based, but it is not a Medicaid program. C. Transition Services

Transition Services are designed to help high school students with special needs secure and sustain employment in their own communities. There are six programs:

- **D.** <u>WIN Program</u> is a four year program in which students participate in half-day work programs at businesses within the community. During the first year, students take part in career preparation activities. In the next three years, students are placed at work sites where they learn about specific jobs in specific industries. They rotate through departments and are mentored by a professional counselor. When they complete the program they move into employment, further job training, or post secondary education.
- E. <u>BEST Program</u> is designed to expose students to technology. They learn first-hand what it's like to work in high-tech environments. A. <u>Housing</u>: Income-eligible Hudson County Residents may receive free legal services related to a housing emergency if there are questions related to legal issues. For example, those who think their eviction notice has not been handled properly may consult with the housing attorney. Those who have been denied emergency assistance at Hudson County Welfare and who have requested a Fair Hearing may want to consult with an entitlement attorney before their Fair Hearing. You must have proof of income and all documents related to the homeless situation; show up no later than 8:30 am to be seen that morning.

- **B.** <u>Family Law:</u> Domestic violence, the lawyer cannot see you if your partner already has an open case with their office. Child Support and Visitation issues on behalf of the person seeking child support and if the defendant is on SSI. Consultation with a family attorney for income eligible individuals regarding matters such as court appearances at the Family Court. It is important that the victim who may seek services is certain that her/his partner is not already receiving legal services at this location; otherwise there is a conflict of interest.
- *Note: Domestic violence or related situations are the <u>only</u> cases under which undocumented immigrants can be assisted at Legal Services.
- **C.** <u>Public Entitlements:</u> This includes welfare issues, emergency assistance, social security denials and unemployment claims matters.
- **D.** <u>Consumer Law</u>: These legal services include bankruptcies, legal assistance for unpaid medical bills and other issues.
